
GHP Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Our membership has continued to grow

- Plot shows our relative membership growth compared to DNP (red) and DPF (blue). The divisional memberships are normalized to the GHP membership when the unit formed in 2005
- We are 10th out of 13 topical groups in size
- We gained nearly 80 members last year, a really great trend but keep encouraging your colleagues and students to join
- We need a strong voice for hadronic physics, especially in a challenging funding environment



GHP member benefits

- GHP hosts a lively biennial meeting, this year with 260 registered participants and ~165 talks!
- We can nominate two regular Fellows each year
- We have two invited sessions at the April meeting
- We have our own sorting categories at the April meeting (hadronic physics) so we have a bigger share of the April meeting than topical groups without them (3 invited + 3 mini-symposia + 6 contributed this year)
- We have our own Dissertation Award for hadronic physics
- Our (hopefully) informative newsletter

Status of GHP General Fund

- Our general fund currently had \$32,616.28 at the end of 2020
- Most of our income is from dues (allocated at the beginning of the calendar year)
- Our other major source of income is from meetings:
 - We have generally either lost money or made a small profit from biennial GHP meetings
 - Thanks to our sorting categories, we made \$900 from the 2019 April meeting and can expect to have some income from 2021 after \$0 from 2020

Status of GHP Dissertation Award

- In November 2020, an anonymous donor agreed to match donations up to \$3,500 by the end of 2020
- GHP members donated \$2,525, so that \$5,050 was added to the fund
- The fund currently has \$20,336.82 (before this year's award presentation)
- To maintain a biennial award, we need to raise the endowment to \$22,500
- We are hoping to make up the deficit by the end of 2021
